## *Why Do We Need A Building Expansion?*

Yes, we have a wonderful Library. And we do know that the people in our community love and appreciate it. But here is something you may now know: We've been so successful that we're bursting our bindings! Here are nine reasons why we need the expansion, and what it will mean for our future.

### *Shelving Space to Accommodate Our Growth*

**Currently:** Our shelving is overflowing with its collection of 60,000 books and other items.

**Goal:** With increased shelving space, our patrons will enjoy an expanded collection.

### *To Accommodate School-Age Children*

**Currently:** Our Children's Library adequately serves children just through pre-school age. We have 2 small tables and 8 preschool-sized chairs to accommodate them, along with 4 computers surrounded by shelves at full capacity.

**Goal:** With an expanded space, the Children's Library will be able to offer services to children through 12 years old. Plans include a larger story-time and reading area, 6 tables with four chairs each, and several more computers.

### *So Teens Can Have a Place to Study and Work*

**Currently:** We offer a Teen Lounge one day a week where middle school and high school kids can drop in, listen to their music, do their homework, and work in groups. The other four days they are squeezed into a section at the far end of the Library with one table, 4 chairs, and a few floor mats. Shelving space for the teen collection is severely limited, and in addition, adults in adjacent areas often complain about the presence of teens.

**Goal:** The new Teen Area will have group study rooms, a Student Study Zone for quiet study, online resources, and shelving for an age-appropriate collection to support their learning and interests.

### *A Dedicated Technology and Training Center*

**Currently:** The Library holds one hands-on technology class a week for a limit of 12 attendees. Training in MS Word, Excel, Windows, digital photography, and many other topics of interest to the community are offered, but most have a wait list. Often, the waiting period for the next class can be up to six months.

**Goal:** We will be able to offer hands-on daily technology training for 20 attendees. In addition, the computers will be available for general patron use every day.

### *To Accommodate Program Demands*

**Currently:** The meeting room is in constant use, and demand for it can not be met. Each year there are more than 500 programs and meetings in the Founders Room. These include programs for adults on a variety of current topics of interest, along with regular art shows, film programs, afternoon programs for teens and children, foreign language discussion groups, book discussion groups, technology training and various library meetings. The current space seats 44.

**Goal:** The meeting room, with a capacity to seat up to 100 adults, can be partitioned to allow for two meetings and other programs to occur simultaneously (i.e. after school reading and homework programs for teens and younger children, and cultural programs for seniors and other adults.)

### *A Place Where People Can Study Together*

**Currently:** There are no group study areas, yet there is a constant demand for quiet group study space and for small community meeting discussion areas.

Volunteer tasks include sorting, pricing, and arranging books before sales; staffing the cash box and stocking the shelves during the sales; and packing up books when the sales are over.

Recent additions to our Local Authors Collection include:

*His Cold Feet: A Guide for the Woman Who Wants to Tie the Knot with the Guy Who Wants to Talk About it Later (2008)* by Tiburon resident **Andrea Passman Candell**. A collection of stories, commentaries and practical advice.

*Dark Aura (2007)*, a new Carla Day novel by Belvedere resident **Diana O'Hehir**. In a Northern California community peopled by aging hippies, prophesying teen Tamina Kerry has fallen to her death—or was she pushed? Carla knows she needs to find out fast. A suspenseful and captivating read!

Two novels and a book of short stories about women, by **Brenda Pasko** of Tiburon: *The People Below the Stairs (2001)*, *The Kansas Chronicles (2002)*, and *To the Piazza Fiume (2007)*. Fascinating stories of women trapped in self-made nightmares, jealous neighbors, and other struggles.

*If a Tree Falls at Lunch Period (2007)*, by Tiburon resident and award winning children's book author **Gennifer Choldenko**. Set in a California private middle school, it deals with issues of race, class and marital discord fearlessly, and is also one of the funniest books this year in children's fiction.

*Marin County (2007)*, by **Branwell Fanning**, Tiburon's official historian and two-time mayor. A wonderful photographic journey of the county's history written for the *Images of America* series.

*Mourning Dove (2007)*, by **Dr. Patricia Garfield**, of Tiburon. An inspirational and poignant book of dream poems by one of the world's leading experts on dreams.

*I Remember Mollie (2007)*, by Belvedere resident **Peggy Lumpkin Keon**. A loving, short, illustrated biography of the author's mother.

*The Kosher Billionaire's Secret Recipe (2007)*, by Belvedere resident **Stacy Cohen**. Ms. Cohen describes her gourmet kosher lifestyle amid hopes it can inspire others to live full and healthy lives.

*Leah Schwartz: The Life of a Woman Who Managed to Keep Painting (1990)*, by local artist **Leah Schwartz** of Strawberry. A beautifully illustrated autobiographical book featuring Ms. Schwartz's oil on canvas and watercolor floral and landscape paintings.

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## Series Books for Children and Teens

Few avid readers among us can forget the hours we spent as kids devouring Nancy Drew or Hardy Boys books. The pleasure we experienced reading these books was perhaps exceeded only by the benefit we gained in becoming proficient readers. With summer coming, now is a great time to introduce our own kids to series books.

While Nancy Drew and Hardy Boys books remain in most library collections, including ours, their appeal to children and teens is somewhat overshadowed by a number of more current and relevant series books.

Are series books really the caliber of books we want our teens and children to read? Teachers and librarians do indeed see value in encouraging kids to read series books. Reading proficiency requires lots of practice, and series books supply this in a pleasurable format.

Series books contain:

- Exciting stories to hold kids' attentions.
- Recurring, likable characters that solve problems without adult help.
- Formula aspect that promotes faster reading.
- Vocabulary building for greater confidence and comprehension.
- Social benefit from sharing with friends.

Of course, one of the most important consequences of reading series books: pleasure! A lifelong love of reading is often the happy result. (See Librarians Alicia Bell and Jacki Shafer for series books recommendations.)

## Expansion, *Continued from page 1*

**Goal:** We will have four small group study rooms, two for six people and two for up to ten people. They can be used by students for after school study, and by writers, researchers, and community groups during the day and evening. These study spaces have been cited as a high priority in all focus groups and in other meetings on the expansion.

### *Work Space for Library Staff and Volunteers*

**Currently:** Workspaces are very crowded. Staff is squeezed in one room with little space to move and very limited space for books.

**Goal:** New workspace and offices for staff and volunteers will make it possible to work more efficiently and comfortably.

### *A Library Bookstore and Small Café Will Increase Revenue and Provide a Place to Meet*

**Currently:** The Library can accept only very small donations of books, which are then sold from book carts. This year the Library will make about \$14,000 from the sale of used donated items. This is a wonderful source of revenue but, because of limited space, we are unable to accommodate patrons offering to donate larger collections, and must refer such donations to other libraries.

**Goal:** The new book sale area will allow the Library to accept substantial donations from the community and thus greatly increase our revenue rather than sending donations to other libraries. A small café will enhance the book sale area, as well as serve to attract a new generation of Library users.

### *Storage and Maintenance Space*

**Currently:** Storage is very limited and inefficient. Meeting room chairs are often stacked in the Children's Room, thereby infringing on the children's space. The



maintenance closet is 4 feet by 5 feet. The photo here gives you an idea of how cramped our current storage area is.

**Goal:** The new building will have enough storage space to easily accommodate tables, chairs, maintenance and other supplies in an organized and accessible manner.

**Large Print** – Check out our alcove of large print fiction and non-fiction titles. We also subscribe to the *New York Times Large Print Weekly*, and the *Reader's Digest*.

**Senior Page** – Reference Librarians have selected some great websites especially of interest to older adults. Included are links to social interest sites like AARP, Elderhostel, and SeniorNet, easy access to Medicare, Social Security, and Marin County's Division of Aging for senior resources, as well as entertaining game and puzzle sites. Good news! The Library has just subscribed to Mango Languages, the new online language resource for travelers and other language learners. Using simple web access, Belvedere and Tiburon patrons with library cards will be able to create accounts, and start a series of lessons featuring native speakers and basic conversations. 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## Sounds Good!

The library is pleased to introduce the **MP3-CD** format to our growing audio book collection. An MP3-CD looks just like a compact disc but can contain more than 13 hours of audio data on a single disc, which is far more than the 75 minutes of a standard Audio CD. This means that most audio books will fit onto one or two MP3-CDs.

In order to listen to this MP3-CD, you will need a player that supports it. Most new CD players and many DVD players have that capability. Personal computers and laptops also support listening to this format. It is easy to listen to these audio books on your iPod using iTunes.

## Library Receives Major Gift to Name Bookstore in the New Expansion

**Florence Miner**, a member of the Belvedere-Tiburon Library Foundation Board and longtime resident of Tiburon, has very generously made a major contribution to name the used bookstore and small café planned for the Library expansion. The bookstore will be named in honor of her brother, **Robert Miner**, who co-founded Oracle Corporation in 1977 with Larry Ellison, Ed Oates, and Bruce Scott, and who was often called the heart of the company. According to Florence, he was a great lover of books during his lifetime before his early passing in 1994 from cancer.

The addition of a bookstore and small café will add a new dimension to our Library services and provide us with a steady stream of income to support our collections, programs, and the many services that are provided to the public.

The Belvedere-Library Foundation Board wholeheartedly salutes Florence Miner for her unwavering support and

overwhelming generosity to the project. We are off to a great start toward making our dream of an expanded library for Belvedere and Tiburon residents come true.
